Background

The Edinburgh International Book Festival is a world-leading cultural festival, with democracy, creativity and ideas exchange at its heart. We celebrate the power of words and writing in all of their dynamic and imaginative forms, bringing diverse perspectives together, and empowering our audiences to deepen their understanding of our ever-changing world.

Since 1983, we have welcomed hundreds of thousands of visitors to engage with the world's greatest and emerging writers, thinkers, artists, and performers. Each year, we programme innovative events that broaden the horizons and enrich the minds of our audiences, both in Edinburgh and online. These take the form of on-stage conversations, workshops, creative masterclasses, think tanks, and more, all informed by a culture of open dialogue, curiosity about the perspectives of others, and active embracing of new ideas and experiences. Over the last four decades, we have continually transformed our Festival model to reflect our rapidly evolving world, and ensure our ongoing relevance, with a programme which platforms the most interesting and inspiring publishing from around the world, and balances today's most challenging topics with exploration of how we can work together towards a brighter future.

A registered charity, we are run by a passionate team who believe in the power of words and ideas to ignite imaginations, foster human connection, and challenge the status quo – as well as offer solace, nurture wellbeing, and spread joy. Our Festival aims not just to open up conversations, but to broaden them too: existing as a space at the heart of civil society where nuanced discussion can happen and a spectrum of perspectives can be explored. We believe this role, supporting and influencing public conversation, is vital to society and to the Festival's future.

At the heart of our Festival is a commitment to accessibility, inclusivity, and the creation of a truly democratic environment for the exchange of ideas and collaborative thinking. We give a platform to voices who are often overlooked and aim to break down barriers to access for those who might not typically see themselves as a book festival audience. More than just a summer festival, we work year-round with partners in the local community – with schools,

libraries, prisons, hospitals, and other community hubs – with the aim of developing engaged, knowledgeable audiences of all backgrounds and ages. The Festival also makes hundreds of events available to watch online via a Pay What You Can model, offering audiences who cannot attend in person the opportunity to take part, and making the Festival truly global in nature.

In 2024, our evolution saw the beginning of a new chapter under the leadership of Festival Director, Jenny Niven. It was also our first year presenting the Festival in our new home of the Edinburgh Futures Institute – a cutting-edge university building created from the stunning renovation of the city's old Royal Infirmary and positioned at the heart of the city's Festival environment. We are excited about the opportunities this offers us to collaborate with new partners and share innovations and a wide range of voices with our audiences, both now and far into the future.

Overview

As part of our ambitious new programme Paper Trails - Edinburgh International Book Festival, in collaboration with Edinburgh Libraries' Mobile Library Service, is seeking to appoint four writers to deliver five-week creative projects in older people's residential care homes across Edinburgh. The projects will coincide with and enhance the visits from the libraries team. We want to bring the joy of the Book Festival to people across Edinburgh, who can't come in person.

At the Book Festival, 'writer' encapsulates a diverse range of creative literary outputs: novelist, poet, non-fiction writer, illustrator, comic creator, spoken word artist, playwrights, and producing work for all ages of audiences and readers. For this role we are particularly interested in applications from writers who have experience of working with older people, people with dementia and people with age-related illness in residential settings.

Communities Programme

Edinburgh International Book Festival Communities Programme brings together the very best from groups and organisations across the country with the energy and excitement of the August Book Festival. Produced in collaboration with a variety of partners, this programme of residencies, festivals and one-off events brings authors, artists and audiences together to inspire each other and to be inspired, to share stories and experiences, and bring books to life for people of all ages in their own communities.

Edinburgh Libraries' Access and Mobile Library Service

Edinburgh Libraries' Access and Mobile Service encompasses a range of provisions designed to ensure residents across the city have equitable opportunity to access Library and other Council services. The mobile library makes around 70 different stops across the city covering areas from Balerno and Ratho to Leith and Restalrig. It also visits sheltered housing and retirement flats where a selection of books are brought directly into social areas for residents to browse and select from. The mobile library team work with the care homes to ensure the selection is relevant to the residents, and spend a great deal of time responding to requests for specific titles or genres of books to ensure the library visits are engaging and have a positive impact.

The Role

We are seeking four writers who have experience of working with older people and who can work in a creative and responsive way to ideas from the Book Festival, participants and key partners. This will involve developing the emerging shape and content of the programme in conversation with the care home staff and mobile library team. Writers will be supported by and give support to two trainee artists.

Key responsibilities

- To design, plan and deliver x2 five-week creative projects in a timely and professional manner, in cooperation with residents, care home staff and the mobile library team
- To provide opportunities for the residents to have their voices heard and their creativity to be nurtured and valued throughout the project
- To collaborate with the mobile library team to ensure that project activity enhances the mobile library service visits
- To collaborate with and support a trainee writer
- To work with the Book Festival's Brand and Audience team and others to find ways to creatively tell the ongoing story of the project and its participants
- To write x2 pieces for the Book Festival's On The Road blog (one piece per project/care home)
- To participate in the project's evaluation process, and to provide regular feedback to the Book Festival and its partners.

Person Specification

Essential

- Experience of working creatively with older people, people with dementia and people with age-related illness
- Experience of working with groups of mixed abilities, perspectives and ages
- Experience of working closely and collaboratively with other authors or artists
- Appreciation/knowledge of the value of library services
- Open and flexible attitude to evolving projects and responding to varied stakeholders
- Excellent communicator who can work with and represent the project to various stakeholders
- A creative thinker who can provide support in troubleshooting and creative problem solving
- Commitment to equal opportunities and social inclusion; tolerance and respect of difference
- Generosity of spirit and a willingness to learn from others
- The post-holder must be a full member of Disclosure Scotland's Protecting Vulnerable Groups (PVG) scheme. (The Book Festival can support the successful candidate with this process if they are yet to become a member)

- Dementia Friend Training
- Experience of working across different literary genres e.g. poetry, short fiction
- Experience/appreciation of cultural programming across different art forms
- Access to own car/transport.
