It's been an exciting and interesting year putting together the 2017 Baillie Gifford Schools Programme as writing for children and young adults has never been stronger - tackling tough issues and challenging young minds to question, imagine and wonder. With 62 events for pupils across 7 days, we've created a bigger programme which aims to ensure as wide a choice of genres, topics and authors as possible, bringing together well-established names with some shining new talent.

Tony Ross presents the stories of his stroppy but endearing *Little Princess* series; our 2017 Illustrator in Residence Kristina Stephenson sings and performs tales of Sir Charlie Stinky Socks; and Sue Hendra and Paul Linnet introduce superhero vegetable Supertato's latest adventures. Scottish favourites Lari Don, Theresa Breslin, Cathy MacPhail, Diana Hendry and Jenny Colgan introduce their latest books on a whole range of subjects from thrillers and fantastical tales, to little puffins and the Russian Revolution.

Older pupils get the chance to meet writers and performers from every corner of the globe: from the US come the performance poetry group The Last Poets; from Sweden crime writer Christoffer Carlsson; and from Australia indigenous writers Bronwyn Houston and Jared Thomas. There are challenging and unsettling stories of cults and aliens by Will Hill and Jason Wallace, and American preacher and lecturer Greg Garrett asks why in times of uncertainty we seek tales of zombies, the undead and dystopia.

We're delighted that well-known names including Scottish cyclist Chris Hoy, CILIP Carnegie Medal-winner David Almond and bestselling authors Marcus Sedgwick, Robert Muchamore and Darren Shan are all joining us this year. We're also pleased to introduce some wonderful debut writers: Chloe Daykin presents *Fish Boy*, a moving yet funny story of a boy trying to deal with his mum's ME; Lauren James is a bright new name in the world of science fiction; and Kasia Matyjaszek creates fun, charming and quirky picture books.

There's also plenty happening for teachers. Page 5 lists our offering of Career-long Professional Learning events covering everything from teaching philosophical thinking using picture books, to science writing, creative writing, teen health and wellbeing, and how to engage with the CILIP Carnegie and Kate Greenaway Shadowing scheme.

Giving young people access to the Book Festival and to owning books is a central tenet of what we do. Ticket Prices

- Tickets for schools events are £3.00 each for children and adults (one free adult with every 10 pupils).
- Tickets for CPL events (see page 5) are £8.00 full price, £6.00 concession.
- Concessions are available to over 60s, students, Young Scot cardholders, Jobseekers and disabled visitors.

Pre-Visit Information

Once you have booked tickets, we will send you some basic information to help you plan your visit including maps, directions and risk assessment documentation. We will send this by email so please remember to include your email address when you book.

Career-long Professional Learning

Spruce up your skills!

Our Career-long Professional Learning events aim to give you inspiring new ideas to try out in the classroom. This year we consider innovative ways of teaching philosophical thinking to the youngest readers; find out how to enliven scientific literature; explore teen health and wellbeing; and think about how best to build on author events once back in the classroom. We also look at opportunities to inspire young writers and encourage pupils to get reading for pleasure.

Building on Author Events

Thursday 17 August | 5.30pm-6.45pm

Want to make the most of your class visit to the Book Festival, author visits to your school or online author talks? Poet and literacy specialist Georgi Gill shares tips and ideas for activities to help you harness the enthusiasm of your pupils and maintair momentum when you're back in the classroom. Whatever the age and stage of your pupils, Georgi has ideas to get their creativity flowing.

The Word Scientific Monday 21 August | 7.00pm-8.00pm

As scientific advances become ever more sophisticated and impact on our everyday lives, how can complex ideas be made accessible to young readers? And how do young people learn to write about scientific concepts themselves? Using the Royal Society Young People's Book Prize shortlist as an example, science writer Gill Arbuthnott, teacher Jennie Hargreaves from Lockerbie Academy and education researcher Ruth Jarman discuss the importance of design, illustration, narrative voice and humour in helping children to engage with reading and writing about science.

Inspiring and Supporting Young Writers Wednesday 23 August | 7.00pm-8.00pm

There are lots of interesting initiatives to get young people excited about writing, including opportunities like the Young Walter Scott Prize and the Pushkin Prizes. But what's the best way for teachers to support young writers in the classroom? In a fun event, offering practical tips and advice, editor and award-winning novelist Keith Gray explores novel ways to engage pupils (and teachers) in creative writing.

Peer Pressure and the Power of Social Media Thursday 24 August | 7.00pm-8.00pm

Friendships, peer pressure and group behaviour are huge drivers for adolescents. Social media allows enormous opportunities but also offers challenges, from cyber-bullying to competition, raised anxiety, distraction, over-sharing, addiction and false goals of perfection. International expert on adolescence, Nicola Morgan unpicks the fascinating and up-to-date science behind social media and offers strategies for teenagers (and the adults working or living with them) dealing with the challenges of being constantly connected.

Reading for Pleasure

Friday 25 August | 7.00pm-8.00pm

The CILIP Carnegie and Kate Greenaway Shadowing scheme, led predominately by librarians in schools, was established to encourage reading for pleasure amongst children and young adults, with a focus on high quality fiction. Join Youth Librarian Yvonne Manning, School Librarian Lauren Thow and CILIP Carnegie Medal-winner David Almond as they discuss the unique qualities of the shadowing scheme, and consider how shadowing might develop in the future. Chaired by Joy Court, Chair of the Carnegie/Greenaway Working Party.

Picture Books as Philosophy Hooks Monday 28 August | 5.45pm-6.45pm

How do we support the deep thinking and questions of our youngest readers? Children's authors Alison Murray and Vivian French join Dr Claire Cassidy from the University of Strathclyde to explore how picture books can be used to introduce philosophy to children and promote their questioning. They look at examples of picture books that can be used to stimulate curiosity and discuss what can be done to facilitate philosophical thinking at a young age.





Biography

Born in New Zealand to Scottish parents, Elizabeth Laird has lived in Ethiopia, Malaysia, Iraq, Lebanon and Austria, and now lives in Britain with her husband who is also a writer. She is best known for novels which explore thorny issues in the UK and further afield, including the war in the Middle East and the trafficking of children from Pakistan. Her work has been widely translated and has won many awards.


Back in the Classroom... Considering responses to the refugee crisis

Look at newspaper articles about the Syrian refugee crisis. How do different articles compare to *Welcome to Nowhere* in the way they portray refugees? Have a discussion about how stories are presented in the media and their influence on public opinion.

Read extracts from *Welcome to Nowhere* and talk about the lives of the ordinary Syrians you meet in the story. Compare life in Syria before and after the characters flee their homeland to life in Scotland. What similarities and differences do you see?


Back in the Classroom... Writing fearlessly




Back in the Classroom... Making up your own funny 'I Want' story



Biography

Kasia Matyjaszek is an Edinburgh-based illustrator. Since graduating from Edinburgh College of Art, she has worked on a variety of picture book projects, and her work was highly commended in the Macmillan Prize. *I am a Very Clever Cat* is the first book that she has both written and illustrated. She doesn't know how to knit.

In *I am a Very Clever Cat*, Stockton's best friends and helpers turn out to be the most unlikely animals - mice. Talk about what it means to be someone's best friend. Find out what happens when they both embark on incredible journeys as you meet Diana and Moira and travel through their life-affirming new novels.

Biography

Diana Hendry has published over 40 books for children, as well as poetry for adults. *Whoever You Are*, the sequel to *Out of the Clouds*, is due in 2018. She enjoys playing the piano, yoga and being a granny. Moira Young is from Vancouver, Canada. Her *Dustlands* trilogy has been published in 30 countries. *The Road to Ever After* was inspired by the movie It's a Wonderful Life and is now itself being developed for a film.


Back in the Classroom... Journeying into stories

Learn everything you need to create your own amazing comics in this hands-on session with the Phoenix cartoonist and writer Neill Cameron. Neill encourages you to come up with unique ideas and then shows you how to turn them into exciting, dynamic comics.

Biography

Neill Cameron is creator of the comic books *Mega Robo Bros*, *Mo-bot High*, *The Pirates of Pangaea*, *Tamsin and the Deep* and the instructional *How to Make Awesome Comics*. Since 2011 his work has appeared in the weekly children's comic the Phoenix. In 2016, *Mega Robo Bros* and *Tamsin and the Deep* were both shortlisted for the British Comic Awards.

Back in the Classroom... Creating your own incredible comics

Think of your favourite thing in the world, then think of your second favourite thing and put those two things together. You might have a banana ballerina (bananarina) or a gorilla pirate (gorillate). Whatever you have, imagine what your character would get up to, and then draft out a storyboard of their adventures.

Catherine Barter's *Troublemakers* and Swedish writer Christoffer Carlsson's *October is the Coldest Month* are tense, gritty thrillers involving family secrets and a race against time to uncover the truth. Join these accomplished writers to hear about their latest novels, discover the world of the criminologist and explore what it means to be radical.

Biography

Catherine Barter has worked in a library, a bookshop and for an organisation campaigning for the rights of garment workers. Currently, she lives in East London and co-manages a radical independent bookshop in King's Cross. Christoffer Carlsson began writing at a very young age and since his debut at 23 has written 5 crime novels, as well as a YA novel. In 2013, he became the youngest ever winner of the Best Swedish Crime Novel award.


Back in the Classroom... Exploring the causes of extremism

In *Troublemakers*, London is being terrorised by extremist bombers. Debate the difference between a 'freedom fighter' and a 'terrorist'. Think about what causes a person to go to extremes to protect an idea or individual.

In both Catherine and Christoffer's books, setting is key to the action. In *October is the Coldest Month*, the landscape and environment is almost seen as a character itself. Try writing your own story in which place is key to the narrative – how does your location influence the tone of your writing?


Back in the Classroom... Imagining magical journeys


Back in the Classroom... Exploring food chains

Author of the bestselling *Whitby Witches* series, Robin Jarvis returns with *The Devil's Paintbox*, in which the discovery of a hidden paintbox leads to evil being unleashed. In Scarlett Thomas' *Dragon's Green*, the first book in the *Worldquake Sequence*, 11 year old Effie Truelove awakens her powers and finds out how to travel to the Otherworld. An enthralling event with two writers of tales filled with magic and horror.

Biography

Robin Jarvis is the author of the *Deptford Mice* and *Whitby Witches* series. He lives and works in Greenwich, London. Scarlett Thomas is Professor of Creative Writing and Contemporary Fiction at the University of Kent. She has always loved stories and tried (and failed) to write her first novel at the age of 6. Since then she has successfully written lots of novels, but this is her first for children.

Back in the Classroom... Introducing the fantasy genre to imaginative minds

Magical abilities feature in *The Devil's Paintbox* and *Dragon's Green*. If you discovered you had a magical gift, what do you think it would be? How might it manifest itself?
