



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Welcome to the Book Festival's 2018 Baillie Gifford Schools Programme

I'm very pleased to introduce you to some of the most exciting writers and illustrators for young people - from home and abroad.

This year, the Edinburgh International Book Festival is challenging audiences to consider the concept of Freedom; what this means both personally and across society. To mark the Year of Young People, we're working with a group of youngsters from Craigmillar in Edinburgh to fashion a strand of events exploring this theme. As part of this strand, our team of young people have created an event for P6-S1 pupils involving authors Julia Green and Elizabeth Laird (see p21 for more info).

Freedom plays out across many of this year's schools events including Brian Conaghan with his stark new novel *The Weight of a Thousand Feathers*, William Sutcliffe with an exploration of our surveillance society, brilliant American writer Jason Reynolds looking at gang culture in *Long Way Down* and - for the first time in the Baillie Gifford Schools Programme - Amnesty International.

We have two exciting events bringing together stories, words, music and performance. Cathy Forde talks about the process of taking her novel *Fat Boy Swim* from the page to the stage with musician Michael John McCarthy, while Rwandan-French hip-hop artist Gaël Faye brings a special performance of *Small Country* which details his childhood experience of fleeing the genocide in 1995.

We bring history to life for primary schools: Francesca Simon takes on the Vikings, *Horrible Histories* author Terry Deary explores the First World War, and Theresa Breslin focuses on Mary, Queen of Scots. Plus, there are lots of laughs with the effervescent Tracey Corderoy and Steven Butler; Philip Ardagh and Elissa Elwick put a comedic bent on the natural world; and James Carter brings us his fantastic performance poetry, including an event for pupils with severe learning disabilities.

As always, we've given some classroom ideas alongside each of the events but do also encourage you to come along for the sheer pleasure and excitement of being at the Book Festival. We will be adding lots of insights, ideas and suggestions for topic work to our Learning Site (learning.edbookfest.co.uk) over the coming months so do keep checking back to see what's new.

Plus, check out our CPL events on page 6. These are events specially designed for teachers and librarians, to support you across all areas of creative writing and reading for pleasure in the classroom and beyond.

Accessing the Book Festival



Location

All events in the Baillie Gifford Schools Programme take place in venues in the tented Book Festival village in Charlotte Square Gardens and along the west end of George Street, just off Princes Street in the heart of Edinburgh City Centre.

Edinburgh Waverley and Haymarket train stations and Edinburgh bus station are all within walking distance. If you are travelling to the Book Festival by coach, we will send you maps with information on where to park with your pre-visit information pack. We have a dedicated Road Crossing Assistant to help your pupils reach the Book Festival safely.

When you arrive, you will be greeted in the Book Festival Entrance Tent by our Front of House team who will check in your group and direct you to the relevant venue for your event.





Support Services



Career-long Professional Learning Events

Inspiring New Ideas

Our Career-long Professional Learning events aim to give you inspiring new ideas to try out in the classroom. This year we consider innovative ways of teaching pupils about the natural world and human rights; explore how to introduce young ones to art; and discuss the gifts and challenges of dyslexia. We also prescribe some practical poetry for teachers and librarians to help improve happiness and wellbeing.

The Dyslexia Question

Wednesday 15 August 7.00pm — 8.00pm | Baillie Gifford Corner Theatre

Author-illustrator Lucy Volpin describes herself as 'wildly dyslexic' and never imagined she could be a published writer. Edinburgh-based publisher Barrington Stoke specialises in publishing books that break down the barriers to children getting into reading. Today, they take a frank look at the gifts and challenges of dyslexia. Afterwards, drop into the Baillie Gifford Imagination Lab to chat informally with the panel and seek one-to-one advice and reading ideas.

Building Resilience in Children

Thursday 16 August 7.30pm — 9.00pm | Garden Theatre

Neuroscience tells us that babies are born primed for social connection. Shown through the love of the primary caregiver, this connection shapes a baby's brain to develop the resilience needed to thrive, while adverse childhood experiences have been described as 'the single greatest health threat facing our nation'. Join Michelle Jones and Kara Whelan from Craigmillar Books for Babies, in conversation with research scientist Suzanne Zeedyk, author Carol Craig and picture book writer Debi Gliori to explore the implications for individuals, communities and Scotland as a nation.





He loves adventures and reading penny dreadfuls and dearly wishes he had his own mechanical fox.

Back in the Classroom... Making your own mechanimals



Biography

Ross Montgomery is a children's writer with seven years of primary teaching experience. He has written a number of children's books including *Perijee & Me, The Tornado Chasers* and *Alex, the Dog and the Unopenable Door*. His picture book *The Building Boy*, created with David Litchfield, was nominated for the CILIP Kate Greenaway Medal and sold around the world. Ross currently lives in London.

At first glance, Clémentine Beauvais' *In Paris With You* and Sarah Crossan's *Moonrise* may not seem to have much in common. The former is a love story set in the most romantic city in the world, while the latter is the tale of two brothers, one of whom is on death row. But read a little closer and you will see that they're both written in captivating verse. Today, Clémentine and Sarah reveal why they chose the form and what it adds to their highly emotive stories.

Biography

Clémentine Beauvais is the author of over 20 children's and young adult books in French and English. She also does literary translation - of Sarah Crossan, notably - and is a Lecturer in Education at the University of York. Sarah Crossan has won multiple awards for her work including the CILIP Carnegie Medal and the YA Book Prize. *Moonrise* was shortlisted for the Costa Children's Book Award 2017.



Biography

Melvin Burgess had a variety of jobs before becoming a fulltime writer. Our Booking Policy and Procedure

Tickets are sold on a first come, first served basis. You will be notified within 14 days if your booking has been successful. If your requested event is available, we will email you a Booking Confirmation along with some information to help you begin preparing for your visit. If your requested events are full, we will contact you to discuss alternative options and our waiting list procedure.

If you need to amend or cancel your reservation, you must do so by Thursday 7 June. After that we will invoice the school for the total value of tickets booked. Additional tickets may be booked and invoiced separately, subject to availability. Where numbers are reduced the total amount of the original invoice will remain due.

Baillie Gifford Transport Fund

If you need financial support to transport your class to the Book Festival please apply for our Baillie Gifford Transport Fund. First get an estimate of the cost of bringing your pupils to Charlotte Square for each visit. Then fill in the estimated cost and relevant details on your booking form. The funding allocated is based on economic need and geographical distance.
