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
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




Welcome to our 40th Year

This year our programme has more than 400 live events, including 100+ created for children and families, and more than 100 events available to watch online. Meet your favourite authors, and discover new ones

Join us in the Festival Village, or online, to hear some of the most creative thinkers of our time in conversation: discussing not just their books, but also the big issues facing society today.

There will be lots of opportunities to get involved. Ask questions during the events or speak face-to-face with authors and other audience members in the queue when you get your book signed. You can buy each book from our Festival Bookshop, brought to you by Waterstones, located in the old Fire Station.

The Book Festival is a space for everyone, and we hope the events this year will inspire you to think and wonder and find your voice. We hope they'll move you and make you laugh, even cry. Most of all, we hope they'll help you connect with the joy of words.

Family fun

The Book Festival Village features plenty of spaces for kids and grown-ups to have fun together, including a family play area and our Baillie Gifford Storytime Yurt, where we've got free events and hands-on activities throughout the Festival. Who knows, you might even catch a glimpse of one of your favourite characters wandering off the page and into the real world...

The Festival Bookshop brought to you by Waterstones

Step away from the bustle of the Festival Village to explore the bookshop. Tucked inside the characterful old Fire Station on Lauriston Place, there are titles here for everyone: children, teenagers, and adults alike. This year, our Festival Bookshop is brought to you by Waterstones and we've filled our shelves with an array of titles from visiting authors, related literature, and local publishers. You'll also find exclusive copies you won't get anywhere else.

Book signings

Most authors sign copies of their books immediately after their event in the Book Signing Tent in the Courtyard. Copies of their books will be available to buy. There's no need to reserve a place for signings, simply turn up and join the queue. Check the board outside the tent for timings.

Make a day (or a night) of it

A day out at the Book Festival wouldn't be complete without a tasty treat. There's a range of places to pick up a snack, drink, or something more substantial. If you'd rather bring your own picnic, there's plenty of space to spread out on the grass. We're hoping the sun will be shining, but if not, you can relax in the indoor café and enjoy views over the Courtyard. The Festival Bar is open late, and it's a great place to meet up, serving a range of wines, spirits, and beers.

Programme themes

Climate Positive

Despite the alarming evidence of global heating, many refuse to despair. Greta Thunberg is among them, and her activism has inspired people worldwide. She joins us at the Edinburgh Playhouse for a special event on 13 August. This year's programme also features other amazing writers who offer an energetic call to action and ideas about how humanity can, and must, step back from the brink. *Sponsored by The Skinny*.

Feats of Imagination

What's the relationship between reading, imagination, and health? This question fuels The Edinburgh Readerbank: an ambitious new study from Durham University with whom the Book Festival have forged a major new long-term partnership. Hear from experts as they share perspectives on belief, perception, and the imagination. And then join us in participating in a potentially game-changing study. Find out more at **edbookfest.co.uk/readerbank**.

Grounding

Perhaps it's an effect of the lockdown, but we're seeing so many writers inspired by human rewilding: getting close to the earth and playing their part in restoring its ecosystems. Whether it's Raynor Winn's stories of her hikes with partner Moth or Merryn Glover walking the Cairngorms in the footsteps of Nan Shepherd, authors are doing more than getting out into nature: they're exploring the sustainability of humanity.

Eyewitness Ukraine

The mood in Ukraine remains defiant; 'after the victory' is a widely repeated phrase there. With ordinary Ukrainians travelling to fight on the frontlines, and countless others losing their homes and loved ones in attacks on civilians, this series of discussions features eyewitness accounts from Kharkiv and the Eastern frontline, underlining Ukraine's continuing need for support.

Foundations of Democracy

Citizens of democracies exercise their right to choose the political colour of their politicians. But can they retain full confidence in the frameworks that underpin democracy? Can they trust in the systems that make a successful state? In a series of thoughtprovoking sessions, leading figures join us to ask how we can shore up the very foundations of democratic life.

Family Dynamics

This strand draws together perspectives on family and relationships, inspired by Simon Sebag Montefiore's *The World: A History of Humanity* told through the connecting thread of family. From moving depictions of lost siblings to a stunning new work by Octavia Bright which weaves the tale of recovery from alcohol addiction with the story of her father's developing Alzheimer's, this strand examines the relationships that make us: functional or otherwise.

Ireland: Real and Remembered

A complex portrait of life in Ireland from a kaleidoscope of perspectives, featuring award-winning novelists and non-fiction writers. This year Ireland marks a significant anniversary: 25 years since the signing of the Good Friday Agreement in 1998. If that political treaty brought about a fragile peace after years of the Troubles, how can Ireland come to terms with the enduring memories of conflict?

The People History Forgot

This series looks at some of the fascinating figures who came close to power during their lifetimes, yet in their deaths have been relegated to the margins – until now. In this diverse range of events, explore the unexamined lives of individuals who are worthy of their own chapter in the book of history.

Another Scotland

When a nation's stories crystallise into myth, it's not always easy to retell them in new ways. Yet, that's exactly what a generation of Scottish writers are doing: examining, unpacking, and redrafting foundational Scottish tales through a modern lens. In this year's Festival, leading authors revisit familiar histories and tease out new ways to understand them.

Outside the Box

Meet the innovators whose ideas genuinely offer new approaches to resolving humanity's challenges. Whether they're renegotiating our relationship to time, imagining what we can learn from the future fossils that our consumerist society will make, or rethinking our relationship to familiar things including cities, the NHS, and even cooking, these thinkers fly in the face of convention with fascinating results. *Supported by Claire and Mark Urquhart*.

Transatlantic Encounters

Transatlantic Encounters at the Edinburgh International Book Festival will feature a stellar line up of American and US-based authors – highlighting the diversity of thought and creativity of the United States. Reflecting on a range of literary work, each author will offer a unique and free-thinking perspective on what it means to be a citizen in the United States, how their work reflects their lived experience of America, and their relationship to the rest of the world. *Supported by U.S. Embassy London*.

The Business of Books

The Business of Books series is dedicated to all those interested in the business of the book world, whether an established publishing professional, a budding writer, or an avid reader with a curiosity about the book trade. Sharing best practice and expertise, this strand includes everything from showcases and workshops to discussions of key issues facing the industry.

Inside Out with Emily Chappell

Inside Out features some of the most impressive endurance runners, hikers, and cyclists of our time. Join us in the Festival Village to hear them in conversation with cyclist Emily Chappell. You're invited to take part in activity-based events: exercising and talking with Emily and her guests outdoors. These guided walking, jogging, and cycling adventures will be available for a limited number of participants and at 'talking pace', designed to be comfortable and conversational for everyone involved (please note, participants will need to be reasonably fit to take part). If you've chosen to Pay What You Can to watch an event, your payment will be treated as a donation to the Edinburgh International Book Festival charity, and you will be asked if you'd like to Gift Aid it (UK taxpayers only).

Refund policy

Tickets can only be exchanged or refunded when an event is cancelled or substantially changed. Where demand is high for soldout events, we may accept returns at our discretion. If you've booked a ticket to watch an event in-person, you'll be able to watch the event online for free if you find you can't attend (if the event is being livestreamed). Refunds are not available to latecomers.

Most livestreamed events are available to watch on-demand after the livestream has finished for a period of time. Check the event website pages to see how long an event is available.

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
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
